





Festival to promote waste management and recycling celebrated in city

Chandigarh, November 27: The Energy and Resources Institute (TERI) along with Tetra Pak today organized the TRASH Festival 2014 at the Vivek High School, which generated awareness on waste management and recycling. TRASH (Thinking, Reflecting and Acting for a Sustainable Habitat) was a one-day unique festival, which celebrated 'all things positive in our lives' including positive thoughts, green actions, sustainable practices, people, values, dreams and traditions. The festival was organized by the Educating Youth for Sustainable Development (EYSD) division of TERI to promote and demonstrate the concept of 'Sustainable Lifestyle' and how we need to 'appreciate and celebrate' Planet Earth. EYSD works with schools, colleges, youth groups, ministries, government agencies, corporate houses, and other national and international organizations.

The festival instilled a sense of responsibility among the youth towards the environment, and encouraged them to formulate 'Out-of-the-Box' solutions for environmental problems.

Delivering the Special Address, **Dr Nandita, Dean Student Welfare, Punjab University, Chandigarh,** said: "Our culture encourages us to be one with the Nature. Nature gives us peace and stability, yet prepares us to adapt to changes happening around us. We must adopt practices which generate less waste and be responsible towards our environment."

Dr Satnam Singh Ladhar, Additional Director, Environment Punjab State Council for Science and Technology, Chandigarh, said: "Sustainability can be achieved only when each one of us individually, as well as collaboratively, takes steps towards different environmental and societal issues. We should all join hands with TERI in this initiative called Project SEARCH and help preserve our environment." The TRASH festival included a range of cultural programs, including badge designing, earth dance, street play, Phulkari embroidery, paper art and paper jewelry and stationery. Among the highlights of the festival was a Litter Walk, where students were provided with jute bags to pick up trash, and, TETRelay – a fun relay race with used Tetra Pak cartons. More than 650 participants from different schools in Chandigarh, Mohali and Panchkula took part in the festival.

Initiated in 2010, the TRASH festival, under the aegis of Project SEARCH (Sensitization, Education and Awareness on Recycling for a Cleaner Habitat), is a school education programme on recycling, sustainable development and active citizenship, which has received an overwhelming response from the school community as well as others.
